

Chairman's Report

April, 2012

Dear Fellow Members of the Licking Land Trust,

Four hundred and fifty! That number represents the most members the Trust has ever had. Congratulations to all of you members who made this record-setting year possible, and thank you for your support. This increase in membership suggests that more and more people are concerned about over-development and loss of natural and rural landscapes. We would love to keep raising that number each year and ask each of you to share our story with your family and friends.



Board members, Lyn Boone and Craig McDonald, joined the Trust this year while we said goodbye to Bernie Brush at the close of 2011. Bernie not only was a dedicated Board member for nine years, but he and his wife, Victoria, also placed a conservation easement on their farm. Lyn's expertise in membership and fundraising development has had an immediate positive impact. Craig's knowledge of stewardship and trail-making has proved valuable on one of our core responsibilities.

The Licking land Trust reached out and connected with people over 6,300 times in 2011. Our goal is to inform more and more people about the need to conserve land. In 2011, we published two newsletters and an annual report, participated in the Dawes Arbor Day Festival, the Licking River Roundup and the Hartford Fair, led hikes at Spring Valley and Park Trails, and updated and improved our website.

Some 46 policies and procedures covering 12 standards of the Land Trust Alliance are now fully adopted and in place. In late 2011, the Board worked with consultants to review these policies and procedures and our operations to identify any area for improvement to be addressed before applying for national accreditation. All of this effort has and will continue to improve the way we do business to ensure the Trust will be able to protect its land and easements in perpetuity.

We hope you'll continue to stay involved in the Licking Land Trust and help increase awareness about the importance of land conservation in Licking County.

Highlights

Community Support:

The Trust extends a special thanks to Licking Soil & Water Conservation District, students at Granville Studio of Visual Arts, their instructor, Paul Hamilton, and Denison University student Paige Titcom for donating and painting a rain barrel which was raffled off at the Trust's annual Member Meeting in October. While painting, the students learned about land and water conservation.





In December, the Trust received a \$1,570 grant to purchase a much-needed new laptop, printer and software from Energy Cooperative Round Up Foundation, Inc.

Volunteer Assistance: Board members and volunteers donated over 1,600 hours in 2011, managing the Trust and properties, providing education and outreach programs and working toward accreditation. Potential Easements: Trust Board Members continued discussions with about 20 potential easement donors. A conservation easement is a legal agreement to preserve land and is given to qualified organizations such as the Trust. The landowner retains ownership of the land and the right to control access to it.

Committee Reports

Stewardship

Licking Land Trust Board Members and volunteers continued to inspect and monitor the easements and properties of the Trust.



Monitoring is a critical function of the Trust as it ensures that the conditions and terms of all easements are being upheld. Maintaining the integrity of easements protects the properties in perpetuity. The Trust Board wishes to thank all of our volunteers who helped with the inspections in 2011.

This year saw the removal of the concrete retaining wall and low head dam on Salt Run creek at the Spring Valley Nature Preserve. The subsequent stream bank restoration and tree and shrub plantings have increased wildlife and plant habitats and restored the natural flow of Salt Run, which had been restricted for over 70 years. The project was the culmination of a joint effort between the Licking Land Trust and Granville Township, which received a \$40,000 Ohio EPA grant to fund the project. More planting is planned for the spring of 2012.

The Trust also worked with and provided funding for a local student whose Eagle Scout project will help improve aesthetics at the Spring Valley Nature Preserve.




Education & Outreach

The Trust held two educational hikes this year at its Park Trails property and Spring Valley Nature Preserve. As just one of the ways the Trust fulfills its mission, these hikes provide members and the public with opportunities to learn more about the Trust and its conservation projects.

The Trust also wrote and published its 2010 annual report and two newsletters, one each in the spring and late fall, which all members received and which were also sent to many governmental officials and prospective members throughout Licking County. Copies of the newsletters were also placed in most public libraries in Licking County.



The Trust continued to seek outreach opportunities during 2011. It participated in the Dawes Arbor Day Festival, Hartford Fair and River Roundup, all of which helped raise conservation awareness among hundreds of central Ohioans. The Trust also improved its online presence by maintaining its Facebook page and enhancing its website. More than 1,400 website visits were made during the year, substantially expanding the Trust's exposure and visibility.



Committee Reports

As a combined result of outreach events, mailings, newsletters and online access points, the Trust made over 6,300 separate contacts with its members and the public, by far the highest volume ever. Library distribution of mailings, along with several news releases to the press, also increased the Trust's publicity.

Membership

The Trust achieved the highest membership enrollment in its 22-year history, with members totaling 450. This number substantially surpassed the 2010 level of 400 members. Membership consisted of 322 family

memberships, 52 individual memberships, 32 honorary members, and a number of businesses, governmental units, and students.

Also, 2011 membership included 22 Stewards, a group of individuals and families donating \$500 or more, and 19 Conservators who contributed amounts between \$250 and \$499. These categories recognize significant financial contributions made to the Trust. These individuals and businesses and all members are recognized on pages 8 and 9.

Fundraising & Donor Development

In 2011, the Fundraising Committee launched several new projects, including plans to enhance donor recognition through new giving levels, and the development of a multi-year plan for seeking foundation and corporate support. The Committee also undertook long-range planning for fundraising needed in order to seek national accreditation from the Land Trust Alliance. In collaboration with the Membership Committee, members of the Fundraising Committee began the process of selecting a new member/donor database which will greatly improve communications and relationship-building with members and donors.

Accreditation

The Trust continued work on its multi-step, multi-year goal of national accreditation through the Land Trust Alliance

(LTA). In 2011, the Trust worked with LTA and consultants and completed a Guided Organizational



Assessment (GOA). The GOA involved an intensive, onsite assessment and planning session to address the specific needs of the Trust. It was designed to help the Trust make changes or improvements in operations and capacity to fully realize its mission and meet accreditation standards.

The assessment included an online questionnaire which was completed by all board members. The consultants also met with the entire board in a half-day workshop to identify priorities for the Trust to address in the next six to twelve months. The meeting also helped the Trust set priorities to prepare for accreditation and increase its capacity for permanent land conservation.



Financial Report


The financial position of the Trust remained strong during 2011 with total cash received and total assets increasing during the year. The Trust continues to have no debt. All cash is invested only in FDIC-insured bank accounts with a local bank.

As of December 31, 2011, total assets were \$343,241, of which \$95,019 was cash in various bank accounts and the balance of \$248,222 is the value of land, easements and other assets as stated on the balance sheet.

During 2011, total cash received was \$52,555. Operating cash received, primarily dues, was \$30,546 and included a real estate tax refund of \$9,368. Operating expenses were \$26,659 for the year. Thus operating cash exceeded operating expenses by \$3,887 during 2011.

In addition to operating cash, \$22,009 of cash donations were received during 2011 for legal defense, stewardship and other dedicated funds. These funds now total \$66,457. These funds are dedicated to monitoring protected properties and paying for costs of enforcing conservation easements, if needed. The Spring Valley fund is restricted to projects at the preserve and currently has a cash balance of \$15,287.

The Trust Board reviews the financial statements and transactions, including donations, dues received, interest earned and all expenses on a monthly basis and compares them to the annual budget.
