

Chair's Report

As I reflect on the Licking Land Trust over the past year I have mixed emotions. There were many accomplishments to celebrate; there were challenges met and new ones encountered; there were some milestones reached and some viewed in the distance; there were hellos and goodbyes. It is one goodbye in particular that I think of most—the passing of longtime friend and stalwart land trust supporter Don Wiper. It was Don who introduced me and so many others to the land trust movement. He was a leader of the Trust for many years and was influential at the state and even national levels. We miss him. But I suspect that if Don were here, looking over my shoulder, he would say "Enough about that! Tell them about the organization!" And so, with a smile and nod to Don, that is what I will do.



In 2015 we finally submitted our application for national accreditation. This was the culmination of about 10 years of effort, and we are delighted to announce that we've been accredited! We are now one of about 380 accredited land trusts in the nation (of about 1700 total). Very few all-volunteer land trusts of our size have had the capacity to approach this daunting process, and the effort has made us a much stronger organization. Now that we have achieved this mark of distinction, we are in a good position to partner with other land conservation organizations and to help other land trusts with questions of process, policy and standards. We give special thanks to the many Board members and volunteers that have contributed to this effort over the years. (Accredited land trusts have to be re-accredited every five years so don't go away!)

We would not have been able to apply for accreditation in 2015 but for the work of Wendy Bittel, our Administrative Director. Wendy took a new job down the street at the Granville Public Library last summer, and we certainly wish her well and thank her for her efforts. In

September we welcomed Amy Mock as our new Administrative Director, and I know that I speak for the Board when I say that we are delighted to have Amy on board.

Accreditation requires land trusts to have certain funds available for stewardship and legal defense of protected lands, and so we have become more active fundraisers. Much of our funding is from your dues and donations—so thanks for your continued support! In 2015 we partnered with the Licking County Local Food Council to hold a highly successful Farm to Fork food tasting and silent auction at the Granville Inn—one of our best fundraisers to date. It was so much fun and such a positive event that we are doing it again, so mark your calendars for August 19, 2016.

Our membership remains strong, just below that ever-elusive goal of 500, with a growing number of business members. We continue to reach out to new constituencies to tell our story. With a healthy membership and active fundraising our fiscal status is solid, and we continue to be careful financial stewards. We also strive to be good stewards of the land we protect, and much of our time is devoted to property monitoring, meeting with landowners and neighbors, and acting on management plans. We are in discussions with several prospective easement donors and are working with a number of organizations—like Licking County Soil and Water, Granville Township, Licking Park District, and the Coalition of Ohio Land Trusts—to advance land conservation in our region.

Land conservation is about building community, and I am privileged to do this work with such great Board members, volunteers and members. As members of our community, we hope that you were able to attend one of our events or hikes in 2015. We had great responses to the Turn Off Your Screen week hike in May, the Farm to Fork event in August, and to our annual banquet in November that featured a presentation by Bryn Bird, director of the new Canal Market District in Newark. Numerous students and other community members used lands that we protect for research, education and recreation in 2015. You are cordially invited to join us for outings and gatherings in 2016 please check our website for upcoming events. And thanks so much for your continued dedication to this beautiful place that we call home.

Remembering Don by Doug Spieles, Chair

We lost a Board member this year. Some of you knew him as Don, some as Biff, some as Mr. Wiper. Don served on the Licking Land Trust Board for over 20 years and chaired the Board for 10 years. We miss him.



Many of us are involved with

the Trust because of Don. I know that I am. I remember when he first banged on the door of my office to ask me to serve on the Trust's Board. I asked him what the time commitment was, and he said an hour or two a month! Don, you underestimated!

I was trying to think of an analogy or metaphor for what Don meant to the Licking Land Trust. Maybe we can think of the Licking Land Trust as a house. If he were here, Don would be quick to tell you that he was not a founding member of the Trust. He joined the Board in the third year of the organization. So he was not the builder of the house. He was not the architect, not the caretaker. And then it came to me: Don was a load-bearing wall. He was a pillar. He was the one, with help from many others, who held up the roof of this organization for so many years.

I asked some current and former Board members to share some thoughts on Don, and I received more than we have room to print, but let me share just a few thoughts. Don was a community builder. He saw land conservation and community building as the same thing. He was a mentor to so many of us as we learned how to contribute to this cause. He saw the big picture but paid incredible attention to detail.

He was a man of impeccable logic. I can attest to this! Did you ever get into an argument with Don Wiper? You will lose that argument! It made us glad to have him on our side.

He was the best-networked person I have ever met. I remember selling tickets for a fundraiser on the Granville sidewalk on a Saturday morning. Don knew about 90% of the people walking by, and he got to know the other 10% as they passed, and they got to know him.

He was a man of rock-solid commitment—to the community, to the organization, to business relationships and to friendships.

So, what do you do if you lose a load-bearing wall? What do you do if you lose a pillar? Well, you need some support beams, and you need to get them into place to hold that roof up. We in this organization are the support beams. We are the ones that will keep the roof up. But oh, we will miss that pillar. Thank you, Don. Thank you.

Education & Outreach

The education and outreach mission of the Trust continued to move forward in exciting and successful ways in 2015. The highlight of the year was the first annual Farm to Fork Tasting and Silent Auction held in August at the Granville Inn. The dinner brought out more than one hundred land trust supporters for an evening of gourmet local food, quality music, and excellent conversation. The event, which served to kick off the Licking County Local Food Council's - Local Food Week,

also featured a silent auction offering items donated by more than forty local businesses, organizations, and individuals. In total the event not only served as an excellent promotional opportunity for the Trust, it raised more than \$7500, of which \$6000 was added to the Trust's Stewardship Fund.

The Trust supported a number of local outreach activities in promoting our educational mission this year, including a continued presence at the Dawes Arboretum Arbor Day Festival. The 2nd Annual Granville 'Turn Your Screen Off Week", a national effort dedicated to getting children outdoors, saw the Trust's Board Chair Doug Spieles lead more than 30 community members on a hike through the Spring Valley Nature Preserve. Additionally Trust members supported a bird watching tour of Denison University's Biological reserve.

The Trust continued to widely distribute its selfpublished annual report and spring and fall newsletters. Over 500 copies of each were distributed to every Trust member, Licking County public officials, and made available at local public libraries.

The Trust continues to have a significant online presence averaging more than 200 unique visitors per month. This element of our public presence has grown consistently since the launch of the website in 2009. The Trust also maintains an active Facebook account with followers increasing by 35% in 2015.

In total the outreach and education activities of the Trust have reached thousands of individuals, both informing those already interested in the mission about the nuances of preservation and growing the ranks of individuals taking a new interest in the land preservation movement.

Stewardship & Prospective Properties

Stewardship activity for the Licking Land Trust remained robust in 2015. Board members and volunteers visited all 23 Licking Land Trust protected properties. We continually are building on our baseline data for each property by photo documenting each property visit.

One critical piece of stewardship involves reaching out to new owners when a protected property changes hands. Far too often, these new owners are unaware that there is a conservation or agriculture easement associated with their newly acquired property. Even when they do know, they many not understand all of the restrictions the easement carries with it. This can often result in problems down the road if left unaddressed. This year, two of our protected properties changed ownership and in both cases the Land Trust was proactive in reaching out to develop a positive relationship with the new owners. We certainly do not see ourselves as property police, but we are advocates for the land and we have a

responsibility to you, the community, and the original owner who created the easement to ensure that it remains protected, as intended, in perpetuity.

We are looking forward to 2016 and new opportunities to conserve land in and around the county. One of our main focal points will be areas adjacent to currently protected properties.




Accreditation

The Licking Land Trust announced in March 2016 that it had achieved national accreditation – a mark of honor in land conservation.

The Land Trust Accreditation Commission awarded accreditation, affirming its confidence that the Licking Land Trust lands will be protected forever.

Accredited land trusts across the country have permanently conserved more than 15 million acres of farms, forests and natural areas that are vital to healthy, vibrant communities. Licking Land Trust has helped to protect nearly 1200 acres of open space in central Ohio.

Doug Spieles, Chair of the Trust's all-volunteer Board, noted that "Receiving accreditation is an honor of the highest order, and signals that our organization meets exceptional national standards of performance and trustworthiness. The hard work we have put into this process over the past 10 years has made us a stronger, more effective, and mission-driven organization that is well-equipped to serve our community and the cause of conserving land."

Mike Mickelson, Vice Chair and leader of the Trust's Accreditation Team added, "Over the years, many of our Board members have contributed steadily to our progress along this path, and none more so than our late colleague Don Wiper. The achievement of Land Trust Alliance accreditation is a real tribute to Don's vision for the Trust, and we are permanently in his debt for his leadership and determination."

The Licking Land Trust joins the 379 other land trusts nationwide (out of a total of 1700) that have achieved the accreditation credential. "It is exciting to recognize Licking Land Trust with this distinction," said Tammara Van Ryn, executive director of the Land Trust Accreditation Commission. "Together, accredited land trusts stand united behind strong national standards ensuring the places people love will be conserved forever."

The Commission is an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance, a national land conservation organization working to save the places people need and love by strengthening land conservation across America. Membership & Donor Development

Members of the Trust continued their enthusiastic and generous support of the Trust's mission and activities in 2015, loyally renewing membership, and responding to and participating in the Trust's activities and fundraising initiatives. The membership, with 461 members, was among the four highest levels achieved in the 25-year history of the Trust. Annual attrition of membership was low at about 10 percent; by comparison, the annual attrition of members in nonprofits is often 50-75 percent or even higher, so the Licking Land Trust membership is in excellent shape!

The Trust, with strong member support, continued its fundraising work to complete the funding of its Stewardship Fund by the end of 2020, as required by national accreditation standards of the Land Trust Alliance. Farm to Fork, the Trust's first annual local-foods tasting and silent auction held in August at the Granville Inn, was hugely successful, attended by more than 100 members and friends, and raising more than \$7,500.

Financial Report

The financial condition of the Licking Land Trust remained strong during 2015, with total cash and investments growing during the year. The Trust continues to have no debt. As of December 31, 2015, total assets were \$474,416, of which \$226,197 were cash, Vanguard mutual funds and investments in a trust account, the Board Advised Fund, which is managed by Park National Bank. The \$248,219 balance of the total assets represents the value of the land and easements owned and other miscellaneous assets as shown on the balance sheet.

During 2015, total cash received by the trust was \$39,214. This consisted of dues of \$25,292, donations in memory of Don Wiper of \$2,595, donations to the Stewardship Fund of \$745 and the Farm to Fork gross proceeds of \$10,581.

Total cash disbursed during 2015 was \$31,721. Operating expenses of the Trust totaled \$28,904 and Farm to Fork fundraiser expenses were \$2,818.

The Trust's total cash and securities of \$226,197, as of December 31, 2015, were held in the following accounts: Legal Defense Fund \$63,847, Stewardship Fund \$45,213, Donations and Bequests \$27,347, Board Advised Fund \$78,013, Don Wiper Fund \$2,595 and Operating Accounts \$9,181.

During 2015, the Trust's Board reviewed at each of its meeting the financial statements and all of the financial transactions, including dues and donations totals, operating funds, investment accounts, the budget and all expenses.




