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TEAM LLT PARTICIPATES IN 2019 RIVER ROUND UP

A decades-old dump site on the banks of Raccoon Creek was discovered one fall several years ago by Licking Land Trust Board members who were there on a stewardship visit. The forested site was located on one of LLT's protected easements along the creek. The dump featured rusted pieces of metal cookware, broken bottles, old plastic buckets, and other household junk from days long gone. The visiting team filled a few bags and carried the trash away.

"We thought we had cleared out a good portion of that trash," said Lyn Boone, one of the monitoring team members. "We planned to pick up any remaining debris on a later visit. It's important that our protected properties be free of trash." But the following year, it was clear that high water from the creek's spring flood had uncovered an even larger debris field than was previously visible. "We needed a better plan," said Boone, "and more volunteers and support to tackle this clean-up."

FARM-TO-FORK 2019

The 2019 annual Farm-to-Fork event was held at the Granville Inn on Friday, August 16th. This was the fifth consecutive year for this very enjoyable evening of camaraderie, culinary delights, and silent auction discoveries. Once again, with 111 members of the community attending, all available tickets were sold.

The Trust is elated by the community's continuing support of this annual fundraiser, support that included three Gold-level sponsors, two Silver-level, and 11 Bronze-level sponsors. Proceeds from this year's event totaled \$16,252 (net), some of which is earmarked for specific Trust needs. A 'Giving Tree', new this year, offered an opportunity for attendees to fund an item of their choice, thereby earmarking a donation for a specific purpose. Selected items, totaling \$415, included a backup computer drive, a celebration banner, supplies for kids' activities, environmentally friendly cleaning supplies, an invasive species removal

The 2019 Licking County River Round Up proved to be just the ticket. The annual county-wide initiative, organized by a coalition of governmental and nonprofit agencies, was preparing for its 25th season of cleaning up some 30 miles of waterways in the Licking River watershed. That includes Raccoon Creek, which borders Raccoon Valley Park south of Granville. LLT's conservation easement on both sides of the creek has protected the stream bed and banks as a greenway since 1993.

And now the Trust needed help in ensuring that the area lived up to the word "green." "We were thrilled to sign up as a sponsor and participant in the River Round Up," said Jen Jacquot, LLT's new Administrative Director. "Being part of River Round Up gave us the momentum and additional help we needed to make a big improvement on that property – and all in one day."

The event was held on Saturday, September 7. Across Licking County, about 375 volunteers

participated, seven of whom formed Team LLT and attacked the problem dump on Raccoon Creek. Besides Boone and Jacquot, team members included LLT Board Member Rebecca Swab, Intern Brooke Kauchak, former LLT staff member Amy Mock, and Granville Township Trustees Bryn Bird and Kevin Bennett. While LLT maintains the conservation easement on the creekside land, the property is actually owned by the Township.

Supplied with trash containers and work gloves, the team spent the

morning amassing a sizable collection of trash. The total haul, shown in the accompanying photo, was only part of more than 10,000 pounds of trash and scrap metal that the River Round Up effort collected county-wide, but for Team LLT, it was by far the most significant portion. "It was great to have the River Round Up's help with organization, supplies, and disposal of the waste we collected," said Boone. "The Raccoon Valley easement, so close to public athletic fields and the bike path, is one we can be genuinely proud of again. Thank you, River Round Up, for the partnership in making it happen!"

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LICKING LAND TRUST PURSUES RENEWAL OF ACCREDITATION

Alert readers may experience a certain feeling of déjà vu in reading that the Trust is once again seeking organizational CCRED/750 accreditation. "Didn't we just go through that process?" you may ask. "Really? Is it time to do this again?"

CARDIAND TRUSTISS Yes, it seems unbelievable. but it's time to do it again. The Licking Land Trust won its first national accreditation almost four years ago, in early 2016, following several vears of preparation. After initial accreditation. a land trust's credential must be reviewed and renewed every five years by the Land Trust Accreditation Commission, whose mission is to ensure that organizations like LLT live up to

the highest national standards of excellence in land conservation. And while it won't be quite as big a job to get ready for a renewal review as it was for the first evaluation,

nonetheless a year in advance is not too soon to be working on it.

What does national accreditation mean for a local organization like LLT? The Commission's motto says it all: Sound finances, ethical conduct, responsible governance, lasting

stewardship - these are the all-encompassing aspects of land conservation practices that must meet the standards prescribed by the Land Trust Alliance, the Commission's parent organization. In short, a local organization like ours, no matter how small, must demonstrate

that it adheres to the policies, standards, and practices that national experience and leadership have shown to best promote land conservation with integrity and permanence. And that means guite simply that the landowner, the community, and the land itself are all being well served, in perpetuity.

So our Accreditation Committee's work begins again. Are our policies complete, coherent, and updated? Do our financial documents pass muster? Have we documented our actions to meet legal and IRS standards, and do we manage every transaction ethically? Perhaps above all else, are we living up to our mission and have we earned the trust of our community? All this is what the Commission will want to know.

Our committee is led by Board member Mike Mickelson, and he is joined by his Board colleagues Mary Fitch, Sarah Lynn, Lyn Boone, and Administrative Director Jen

Jacquot. We've already made a substantial start by brushing up our entire set of policies. We're also updating property and easement records, attending conference-call meetings and webinars, and reviewing the

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successes and challenges that we'll share with the Commission. Our pre-application will be submitted in August of 2020 and the full application in November. Wish us well! Having passed this way before, we're sure the journey will be well worth it.
