


NEW SIGNS ARE ON THE HORIZON

FINDING COMMON GROUND By Lyn Boone

Licking Land Trust member Kevin Wilhelm and coauthor Natalie Hoffman have published a valuable guide to navigating controversial topics, How To Talk to the "Other Side" (2020). The book's subtitle reflects its timeliness: Finding Common Ground in the Time of Coronavirus, Recession and Climate Change. Wilhelm, Granville native and CEO of Seattle firm Sustainable Business Consulting, was our 2017 annual meeting speaker.

This book comes to us at a time when radical divisions – political, cultural, sociological, etc. – can hinder civil discourse and impact our ability to make progress on critical problems in many arenas.

Who is "the other side" that the book's title refers to? Wilhelm and Hoffman lean over backwards to present an even-handed, nonpartisan approach as they invite readers of all stripes to the table. The effectiveness of their thesis (that productive communication IS possible, even in the face of paralyzing polarization) lies in their view that successful communication is not about "winning" or convincing one to change position.

Rather, success lies in identifying common ground, a base from which to jump over contentious viewpoints and land on winwin outcomes of shared aspirations.

This compact manual will be useful for organizations, students, and individuals alike. The authors' array of case studies is especially rich in the fields of energy, climate change, and sustainability. But the practical communication tools and tech-



niques they offer are universally applicable, and are presented clearly in handy charts throughout.

Some might say the book's optimistic approach of identifying shared aspirations is simplistic and would not always work as in the cited examples. The authors would probably agree that their method does not guarantee a panacea. It does offer a *starting-place*, a humane attitude toward communication that emphasizes authentic listening, good-faith compromise, and empathy – as exercised from both "sides." It is a hopeful and welcome approach to addressing intractable issues. And it's hard to argue with that!

YOUTH CONSERVATION AMBASSADORS OF LICKING COUNTY

You may have read about the Trust's new Youth Conservation Ambassadors program in the Newark Advocate or Granville Sentinel. We are delighted this new youth outreach effort has been recognized in local newspapers, as well as nationally by the Land Trust Alliance in its newsletter, "Midwest Field Notes".

The Trust embarked on this pilot program to reach out to students to share the land preservation mission. High school students were invited to submit an essay about their passion for the environment and how they hope to promote conservation among their peers. The inaugural Youth Conservation Ambassadors are Breanna Aves, Anna Cahall, Paige Hartshorn, and Shelby Heist of Watkins Memorial, Lakewood, Granville, and Lakewood High Schools respectively. The program is coordinated by Administrative Director Jen Jacquot and Intern Hannah Hartshorn.

The program was scheduled to begin mid-March with a meet-and-greet luncheon. Of course, that was not to be due to the pandemic. The program had been designed around partnership events with Dawes Arboretum, the Licking Park District, and the Licking County Soil and Water District. All were cancelled, so the future of the program was uncertain. Thanks to the ingenuity of the Ambassadors, new ideas formed quickly.

The Ambassadors first planned a county-wide art project, Online Safari", for kindergarten through 5th grade students. Children drew their favorite animals and learned about their habitats. This fun and imaginative artwork may be viewed in video format on the Trust's Facebook page.
